7. General Business

7.1 Local Government Readiness Response Training - Potential Dates, Kirsten Phillips, QDAF – 10:00 am

Kirsten provided the group with an overview of BQ's all hazards sub-plans approach to biosecurity risk management and response. The Dept is preparing a range of materials for industry and LG in preparation for likely response scenarios – e.g. Asian Swine Flu, H1N5.

The purpose of the project is to enhance LG biosecurity readiness. The intention is to deliver this through face to face sessions in the regions in 2025.

Key points:

- A good example is the ASF response plan
- Workshopped with industry and LG
- Looking to align with regional gatherings (ROC meetings etc.)
- High level briefing to Mayors and executive
- Operational training and overview those who would be involved in a response.
- Operational for LG might include waster management, community engagement, customer service, disaster management, biosecurity team.
- Examples of scenarios would include situations like Panama TR4, Asian Swine Flu, Avian influenza, Khapra Beetle.
- DDMG's have been briefed on all hazards approach.

Regional workshops in planning for early 2025. These would be capped at around 35 participants.

7.2 ELGBC project - Cat management workshop summary

Cat management workshop. Summary is in preparation. 38 participants in workshop with 6 external presenters and two observers. Key take away messages:

- Cat definitions of owned (AM Act) vs unowned (Biosecurity Act) offer the best alignment to legislation.
- Desexing programs are essential to any form of owned cat management.
- The region could act quite quickly in the urban and peri-urban unowned cat space, management in wilderness areas more complex to deliver due to bait shyness/complex control tools.
- Socially oriented programs essential to success of urban and peri urban management.
- Clear definitions and workflows upfront (before projects are initiated) or essential to success.

Action: 1. Circulate the workshop proceedings/summary when collated. 2. Consider altering definition of 'feral cat' in biosecurity plans to 'unowned cats' to align with definition under the Biosecurity Act.

ELGBC biosecurity roadshow rollout

Discussion around the hosting of events within LG's. So far Mareeba and Cassowary Coast have hosted events.

- The Mareeba event delivered a practical demonstration of aquatic herbicide for the management of Amazon frogbit and other aquatic weeds. It followed on from the shires PMAC meeting and was well attended.
- Cassowary Coast hosted two events which were focused on community and stakeholder engagement around the revised Cassowary Coast Biosecurity Plan. The turn out to the events was not as popular as anticipated.
- Cairns Regional Council had also planned an event to showcase key biosecurity issues in the revision of the biosecurity plan. The event was postponed due to a low level of interest.

The committee discussed the ins and outs of the approach taken. It was agreed trying to bring an audience to a biosecurity event was a challenge. An alternative approach recommended is to take pre-prepared materials and collateral to existing events planned by other groups. These could include ranger forums, industry events, or other social gatherings and events where an audience is already established.

Action: 3. Review the approach (and template) and recommend alternative delivery means to achieve the desired increase in participation and understanding in biosecurity issues. 4. Identify a series of regionally significant issues relevant to individual councils expertise which are best presented via a collateral approach.

7.3 High pathogenicity avian influenza update for local government

(12:00 – 1:00 pm) lunch session [Join event](#)

The committee dialled into the statewide HPAI briefing for local government during the lunch break. Key take home messages included:

- There are very few landfills in the Wet Tropics coastal region, the expectation that LG's can manage carcass disposal through existing facilities is onerous.
- H1N5 is most likely to have significant impacts on wild bird populations. LGs are likely to be drawn into this response due to proximity to towns and communities.
- The impact is likely to be significant for many smaller councils who may have capacity to respond with existing resources.
- There are many preparations taking place in the background at a state and national scale. Potentially impacted industry has also been engaged e.g. poultry farms.
- Any State-led program is likely to over-ride any level of local planning and action. It is likely LG's will receive directions rather than lead any on ground response.
- Mammals and wildlife other than birds is likely to be susceptible.
- A watching brief will be maintained until an event occurs.

	<p>An incoming request for attention to the dingo management situation at Kewarra Beach was raised for discussion. Cairns provided an overview of the approaches and challenges in the peri-urban context. FNQROC provided an overview of their response to the committee. The situation was of interest and relevant to all councils. Future developments and management learnings will be discussed in due course.</p>	
9.	<p>Points for noting to the FNQROC Board</p> <p><i>A recent ruling by DESI on Cairns Regional Council disposal of carcasses of feral pigs, roadkill, and other animals has found that council is in breach of waste regulation when using the established disposal process. As a result, council is now incurring significant costs to store, then transport, animal carcasses to Springmount WMF. Cairns Regional Council is the subject of the DESI finding, but it also impacts Douglas Shires feral pig management program (as well as other private and public programs across the region).</i></p> <p><i>A solution is being sought while the current options are considered or actioned.</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Maintain a watching brief on the situation in Cairns Regional Council -(ongoing)</i> • <i>Raise with the FNQROC Waste Management Technical Committee - (underway).</i> • <i>Provide update to LGAQ and National Feral Pig Coordinator - (complete).</i> • <i>Raise issue with the Departments prior to raising to relevant Minister/s requesting DESI develop a suitable solution with QDAF.
